Information Relevant to Indicators

- Number of members is 149, which is 84.7% of schools. We are now including an additional category where membership is pending and an intention to join has been shared. The 22 pending schools give us a total of 97.2% joined or having indicated an intention to join.
- We are chasing the final five institutions, none of which have indicated an intention not to join.
- All sectors are in the process of categorisation in accordance with the school improvement strategy.

Information Relevant to Indicators

- The percentage of good/better Sheffield schools ended 2015/16 at 81.8%.
- The sector good/better data was 82.0% Primary / 73.9% Secondary / 100% Special
- The proportion of good/better schools had increased overall (all sectors) by 5.2% in 2015/6.

- Since January 2015 (when the project began) Sheffield's proportion of good/better schools had increased by 10.5%.
- The summer term had limited impact on the headline percentages, with almost all outcomes matching the previous judgement. This included a small number of missed opportunities to improve the good/better number through the inspection of RI schools.
- The RAG rating has not increased because although the number of downward judgements has been fewer, they have all led to inadequate judgements.

3. Pupil Outcomes

Information Relevant to Indicators

Summary – 2015/16 data picture is not yet complete but we have enough to suggest that it has been a positive year with relative performance having improved in EYFS, KS2 and KS4. This continuation of the upward trajectory means that we now have a broadly national average performance at all stages of our education system. This is to be celebrated but set in the context of our greater ambition.

The decision to continue to RAG rate as Amber was marginal and we could make a strong case for a Green rating underpinned by the upward trajectory. We determined that it should not be Green until all key measures at least matched national, with some exceeding.

- Foundation Stage 2016 GLD outcome is 69% (matched national).
- Relative attainment is improved by 1% point in EYFS.
- EYFS Inequality gap narrows by 4% points.
- Year 1 Phonics 2016 outcome is a 4% point increase to 77%.
- Relative attainment is static at -4%(national also improved by 4% to 81%).
- KS1 SATs Pupils working at or above expected standard in 2016 is: 71% (reading); 65% (writing); 71% (maths). Gaps with national are: 3% (reading); 1% (writing); 2% (maths).
- Relative attainment is 1% worse in reading and maths but 1% better in writing.
- KS2 SATs Pupils working at or above expected standard in all subjects (combined) 2016 is 52%.
- Relative attainment is 1% point better and the gap to national is reduced to 1%
- KS2 SATs Pupils working at or above expected standard in 2016 is: 62% (reading); 73% (writing); 70% (GPS); 69% (maths). Gaps with national are: 4% (reading); 1% (writing); 2% (GPS); 1% (maths).
- KS4 (GCSE) 2% point increase (to 56%) in previous key measure (5 A*-C GCSEs including Eng and maths) would have potentially narrowed the gap to national.
- KS4 new key measure Progress 8. Provisional data suggest positive city outcome is likely (+0.2 when compared to 2015 data but likely to remain positive but be closer to zero in final data)
- KS5 (A-level) results were stable (previously broadly national) but we await confirmed data.
- Further data is expected, including RAISEonline, is expected throughout the remainder of the autumn term leading up to the performance tables, which are expected in December 2016/ January 2017.

4. Outcomes for Vulnerable Pupils

Information Relevant to Indicators

Summary – The Sheffield Performance Analysis Report will be available in November 2016 and should be a substantive item at a subsequent board meeting. This will be written once the majority of the national data set is known and then revisited early in 2017 to be further updated.

At this point, whilst we have headline outcomes we do not have comprehensive analysis of pupil groups progress and outcomes for vulnerable pupils (e.g. in all sectors). Early analysis trends will be shared in the meeting.

For information – below is the 2015/16 year-end position (as previously reported):

- The latest data for attendance (which now extends to the end of the fifth half term of the year) shows an improved performance in both the primary and the secondary sectors.
- Primary attendance, which dipped in 2015, has returned to the upward trajectory of 2013 and 2014. The current figure of 95.9% is 0.3% up on the previous year.
- Secondary attendance has continued to gradually improve and is slightly up on the same period last year.
- Attendance in the Special sector has dropped very slightly compared to previous years.
- Persistent absence has reduced in all sectors: by 1.4% in primary to 9.8%, by 0.8% in secondary to 14.1% and by 7.5% in special to 29.6%.
- At the end of the half term 5, fixed term exclusion data shows an increase in primary, no change in the secondary phase and a reduction in special schools.
- Permanent exclusions are also increased in the primary sector. There is a slight reduction in the rate of permanent exclusions in secondary.

Additional information – Sheffield SCC held a Peer Review focused on attendance, in which Learn Sheffield participated. Sheffield's ranking has improved but on the most recent national comparison data (Autumn term 2015) it still ranges between 113 and 133 (of 150 LAs). Our performance is significantly below national (in the bottom quartile on all measures) and also below statistical neighbours (average ranking 8.8/11). Performance is better than the core cities average in primary and special but still has an average ranking (4.2/8) below the mid-point.
