Do you know a young carer who is isolated and in need of a break? Is lack of money stopping them from getting much-needed respite? If so, the Young Carers Activity Fund could help.

Sheffield Young Carers administer the Young Carers Activity Fund on behalf of Sheffield City Council to give carers aged under 18 up to £300 to fund a break from their caring role. This could include things like music lessons, spa days, a gym membership or activity equipment for home like a trampoline, a magazine/film subscription or a computer.

The next closing date for applications is **Thursday 23rdFebruary 2017**.

Here's how the grant has made a difference in the past.

"I would just like to say a very big thankyou for my grant! I have been able to buy all the sports clothing & equipment that I need and now I feel really well prepared and comfortable ... It has also meant that my Mum doesn't have to worry about finding money... which has helped a lot!"

"The grant has helped me buy a bike and all the safety equipment I needed to be road safe. This has meant that I now have the freedom to get out and about with my friends and explore both my local area and further afield... I've never had so much exercise since having my own bike! Young Carers Governor Training: Best practice for identifying and supporting pupils with caring responsibilities

1 in every 12 young people are taking on mid- to high-level care for a family member (BBC 2010). This means there are over 7,000 school age young carers in Sheffield. Many young carers go unidentified, however, and experience significant educational, physical, social and emotional impacts as a direct result of their caring role. Early identification of young carers is vital to help minimise these impacts.

This engaging, interactive workshop will help Governors understand the issues that affect young carers and how schools can improve their outcomes by:

Gaining an understanding of the reasons why children and young people are caring, the types of care they provide, the indictors of being a young carer, and the impacts this can have on them

Finding out about recent changes in legislation and local policy affecting young carers

Getting information on best practice and free resources for identifying and supporting young carers in your school

Young Carers Strategic Board – Schools Representative Opportunity

PE Pledge for Sheffield Primary Schools

Ambition School Leadership Programmes –

Both primary and secondary programmes are high impact leadership development programmes for middle leaders in secondary schools in challenging contexts. **The duration of the programme ranges from 1-2 years.**

Primary ML Development:

Teaching Leaders Primary is a high-impact leadership development programme for middle leaders in primary schools in challenging contexts.

- TL Primary Associates (Route 1): suited to newer middle leaders looking to build their core leadership skills
- TL Primary Fellows Direct to year 2 (Route 2): selective and aims to stretch and grow high-potential middle leaders, helping them to deepen their impact

We have participants from a number of Sheffield primaries, including Hatfield Academy, Byron Wood, Hartley Brook, Lower Meadow, Oasis Academy Don Valley, Pathways E-Act and Watercliffe Meadow.

Entry to Year 1 costs £1000 which would cover the 2 year programme. However, as Sheffield and the surrounding area is a priority for the National College, we are able to offer Category 5&6 schools our Leadership Talent Subsidy meaning TL Primary Fellows (Direct to year 2) places are eligible for a 50% subsidy, at a cost of £500. If you would like to put someone on either of these programmes, please let Sean Finch know (sean.finch@ambitionschoolleadership.org.uk). Alternatively, nominations can be made online here. Sean will be able to pick these up and apply the discount if you wish to nominate staff directly to year 2.

The deadline for nominations is 6th March. We hope this date will allow schools to succession plan accordingly and we will be able to support nominees through the online application form.







for BME Leaders

Evidence shows that there are enduring diversity challenges within the school leadership workforce. 4.3% of teachers in the Yorkshire and Humber region are from BME backgrounds yet only 1% of head teachers are BME. These programmes have been developed in partnership with the Yorkshire and Humber Diversity Steering Group in order to tackle such equality and diversity challenges.

This programme is for black and minority ethnic (BME) teachers, male or female, who are (or should be!) considering applying for their first leadership post (primary, secondary, special or other setting). Participants must be a BME teacher with 3 years' experience and evidence of success as a classroom teacher, and have the endorsement of their Head teacher.

The aim is for participants to:

- -Develop a range of knowledge and skills to support and strengthen promotion to a leadership post.
- -Increase self confidence and self belief.
- -Secure a deeper understanding of leadership roles in schools and how they may differ in different organisations.
- -Programmes provide a pathway for credit transfer into a University of Leeds Masters or Doctor of Education degree

What does it Involve?

This programme has now started, but it isn't too late to nominate colleagues to attend.

- -Introductory twilight meeting now passed
- -A two day (one overnight) residential—10th-11th February
- -Three face to face sessions- 2nd March, 3rd May, 6th June
- -A 'review of learning' twilight— **10th July.** This will focus on sharing learning and experiences, evaluation and next steps.

NCTL funding means that the programme is available at no cost to successful applicants or their schools (but places are limited).


What does it Involve?

- -A full 'face to face' day which will focus on the aims of the internship, expectation of participants and strategies to maximise the learning and positive impact of the programme
- -A five day internship spent with a school's senior leadership team, actively engaged in Deputy Head teacher or Head teacher duties (appropriate to the participants next stage promotion).
- -A 'review of learning' half-day. This will focus on sharing learning and experiences, evaluation and next step. (All new dates to be confirmed.)

A subsidy from your Local Authority and some of the region's Teaching School Alliances mean that the programme is available at a cost of only £400 per participant. If your school has a subscription to the Yorkshire Leadership Community, then a discount of 10% will automatically apply. However, a limited number of places are being offered FREE of charge, due to grant funding, and there is also a contribution towards cover available. For details please contact:

A great free opportunity – Barnardo's Celebrating Diversity with Pride : Survey Live!

Barnardo's Positive Identities Service works to raise awareness around sexual identities and gender identities, and prevent discrimination and prejudice. We support young people who identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual Trans and Questioning (LGBTQ) and work to tackle Homophobic, Biphobic and Transphobic (HBT) discrimination and bullying, striving for a more equal society in which everyone feels able to be proud of and celebrate who they are. We are one of six organisations funded by the Government Equalities Office, supported by Department for Education programme to tackle HBT bullying in primary and secondary schools: we were initially involved in the 12 month pilot programme, in which we used a whole-school approach to embed good practice, and we will be working with 200 schools across the Yorkshire and Humber region.

The work is <u>funded and free</u> to schools and is a fantastic opportunity to create a sustainable, embedded culture of promoting equality and inclusion, celebrating diversity and of effective anti-discriminatory practice. The programme aims to upskill school staff to ensure they have the confidence, knowledge and skills to effectively support children and young people around sexual and gender identities and to positively challenge discrimination and prejudice. We are really happy to be able to offer this funded opportunity at no cost to all primary and secondary schools across Yorkshire and Humber region.

The policy goal of this programme is to reach schools which have no, or ineffective measures in place to tackle HBT bullying. Therefore schools are not expected to have undertaken work on tackling HBT bullying in the past. This is important as:

- a) we will be able to provide support to the schools which most need this intervention,
- b) it will be easier to assess the impact of the intervention and
- c) make a real difference in students' lives.

Schools will be provided feedback from their completed surveys, which can be used as evidence for future Ofsted Inspections. Local authorities who will cascade surveys will also be provided with key trends from the surveys to inform their planning to support schools. We are really keen to work with clusters of schools as well as academy trusts so we can support primary and secondary schools to have an inclusive school environment.

In our first round of recruitment we have already identified 130 schools that can be part of the programme. In our second round of recruitment we would like to recruit a further 110 schools across Yorkshire and Humber.

If you have not already completed an eligibility survey to be part of our Programme, please complete it via the link below. If you are eligible for the programme we will ask you to then complete a detailed survey (depending on if you are a primary or secondary school) which helps us assess where that school is at, their current approaches and where we may be able to offer support. This is about working with the school; identifying strengths, areas which we could help the school further strengthen and aspects in which we could support the school in developing. The detailed survey allows us to establish whether a whole school approach or a training only approach (information attached) will work for your school- **Model One:** A "Whole School Approach" to addressing HBT bullying, or **Model Two:** Targeted training for school staff, in order to build their confidence and capacity to prevent and respond to HBT bullying and build inclusive school environments.

A timetable of intervention will be agreed with all schools covering the duration of the Programme with a mandatory requirement that all schools will be involved in the national independent evaluation led by the Department for Education and the Government Equalities Office.
