

VACANCIES FOR CLERKS TO GOVERNORS

Would you like to be part of a busy and interesting team?

The Governance Improvement Service (now part of Learn Sheffield) are looking for individuals with an interest in education to work with the team.

The role of the clerk to governors is essential at governing board meetings in schools and academies in Sheffield. As well as providing procedural support and guidance during the meeting, clerks are key in ensuring that the meeting minutes capture examples of how governors have fulfilled their 3 main functions:

- 1. Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction.
- 2. Holding executive leaders to account for the educational performance of organisations and it's pupils and the performance management of staff.
- 3. Overseeing the financial performance of the school and making sure it's money is well spent.

The minutes that a clerk to governors produces need to be clear and comprehensive and therefore experience of summarising meeting discussions is important.

The meetings often take place in the evenings and last on average 2 hours; the minutes need to be ready for checking by the Chair within 7 days.

As of Summer Term 2018, the ten most northerly Maths Hubs will be providing training and bespoke support for settings in priority areas in their region to support Early Years practitioners with developing their mathematics specific knowledge and pedagogy.

Early Years Subject Knowledge—Information and Application (2018)

This programme will focus on mathematics with children aged 3-5.

Activities will include:

* Leaders and practitioners attending one central day at the start of the programme which will focus on the key principles of effective mathematics practice in Early Years and one day at the end of the programme to share findings and identify next steps

- * Practitioners (the same person to attend each day) to attend an additional 4 days of central training
- * The face to face days will focus on the key concepts in Early Years mathematics
- * Leaders and practitioners to fully engage with the gap tasks set from each of the training days

Who can apply? Settings that have identified their staff may not have Early Years maths training & settings in which data shows mathematics is a priority area for development.

Developing the Leadership Capacity for Early Years Mathematics – Setting working with a PD Lead

Beginning in the summer Term 2018 and continuing to summer 2019, each hub will accept settings to engage in the following programme.

Activity will include:

* Leaders meet with an Early Years PD lead to identify priorities for their mathematics provision

* PD leads with setting-based leaders will develop a bespoke programme to support the leadership capacity in their specific setting

* Leaders will access specific support sessions either individually or as part of a cluster that supports them with priority actions (and identify practitioners within your own setting that may benefit from the content of these specific sessions)

Participation in this programme will provide numerous benefits including support and development for leaders, access to workshops aiming to develop understanding around key themes, and on site visits.

Who can apply? Leaders from settings where mathematics is a priority for development

Funding—There is no charge to leaders for participating in the programme, there will be no charge for attending the activities which will be local.

About the Youth MHFA in Schools programme

This three year programme launched in Easter 2017 and is fully funded by the Department of Health with a value of £200 per person trained. In the programme's first year we aim to train 1,000 secondary school staff to become **Youth MHFA Champions** – someone with the skills to spot the signs of mental health issues in young people and guide them to a place of support. By the end of 2020 every secondary school in England will have been offered the opportunity to attend this training. This is a major step forward in our campaign to ensure that every school has access to Youth MHFA training - and our social mission to train one in ten people in Mental Health First Aid skills.

Wellbeing App Pilot

Primary Secondary Special

The pilot will involve 10 schools (6 primary, 3 secondary and 1 special) who will work collaboratively to develop and make bespoke the app 'Fit2teach' for the pilot schools. Representatives from the schools will initially meet with the developers to consider the current evaluation of teacher workload through the app and to propose modifications to the current set of questions. In addition the 'working group' will make decisions on how the data is presented to schools and individual users.
