Attendees may later have the opportunity to contribute to writing lesson plans and teaching activities based on inspiring local and global examples of people effecting positive change without resorting to violence.

From September 2019 to July 2020 a number of schools will be selected to pilot the materials, with funding provided to release teachers for half a day per half term to work together to share experiences and develop the lessons.

The project materials will be published and disseminated nationally in the final year of the project (August 2020 to June 2021).

The lesson plans will:

- Provide inspiring case studies of groups of people locally and from around the world, past and present, involved in non-violent social change.
- Offer pupils ways to think critically about gender issues and enable them to understand that masculinity can be expressed in non-violent ways.
- Engage pupils with local and global issues so that they feel motivated to work for change.
- Help pupils to decide on actions with a local or global impact and give them the tools to carry them out.

SHEFFIELD PRIMARY SCHOOLS NEEDED TO SUPPORT SMOKEFREE HOMES CAMPAIGN.

Smokefree Sheffield is an initiative funded by Sheffield City Council and made up of partners across the city who are working together to help more people quit smoking for good.

THE CAMPAIGN

A new campaign launching this month will highlight the dangers of second-hand smoking on children. Children who are exposed to second-hand smoke have a much higher risk of developing health-related issues, as well as becoming smokers themselves in later life. As children are more likely to be exposed to second-hand smoke in the home, the campaign will focus on helping parents to create Smokefree Homes for their family.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

To encourage participation, we're asking selected primary schools across the city to support the campaign.

St Wilfrid's English Hub

St Wilfrid's Primary School is an outstanding school in the South of Sheffield with a track record of high performance.

The school places a high profile on early reading through a strong commitment to systematic, synthetic phonics. From the moment the children start at St Wilfrid's, our mantra is that 'reading is the core purpose' because reading opens up the world to our children and, if a child can read, they can access the curriculum, develop a strong vocabulary and ultimately love reading for the rest of their lives. The school is part of Learning Unlimited Teaching School Alliance and is outward-facing with a track record of school to school support.

St Wilfrid's English Hub

The English Hub exists to promote three priority areas:

Early Language Development

Providing evidence-based approaches to early language development and closing the word gap in school-based early years settings, including appropriate use of formative assessment;

Age-appropriate Phonics Provision

encouraging best practice in systematic synthetic phonics teaching from school-based early years provision to the end of Key Stage 1, and as the primary reading strategy throughout the school. This includes

- encouraging fidelity to a single systematic synthetic phonics programme;
- supporting the effective use of decodable books in the early stages of learning to read, as a way of establishing phonic decoding;
 supporting effective practice in formative assessment in relation to phonics/early reading.

Promoting A Love Of Reading

encouraging reading for enjoyment including by supporting whole school reading approaches, reading to children at least once a day and encouraging reading at home, developing teachers' knowledge of appropriate children's literature.

What Will English Hubs Offer?

Support in 2018-19 will include:

Showcase Events

Showcase events for school leaders and teachers to see excellent early language and reading teaching in practice.

Action Plans

Assessing and offering feedback on the action plans, including assessing requests for resources.

Audits

Carrying out an audit in schools using the audit framework provided by the Department.

Financial Support

Offering financial support for schools to buy resources. There will be a presumption that these resources are match funded by schools (with a cap of £3,000 per school). However, if schools meet two of the following criteria the hub will have discretion to offer outright funding at a cap of £6,000 per school:

- Phonics Screening Check score below the national average;
- Ofsted Requires Improvement or Inadequate;
- 🖌 Above average numbers of pupils eligible for the Pupil Premium; and/or
- The school is in an Opportunity Area
- Cover costs to attend a Showcase Event

Support in 2019-2020 will include up to six days of support from a literacy specialist per eligible school.
