Let's talk rubbish at school!

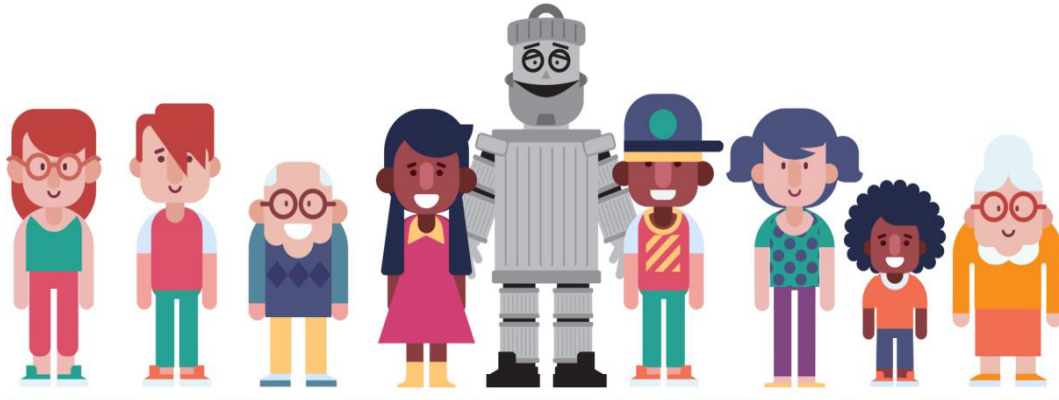

The Launch of Sheffield's Year of Reading

Sheffield's Year of Reading launches across the city on 15th January 2020 and will be a 12-month, citywide celebration of creativity and the written word.

Reading is the key that unlocks the door - it helps us feel better, discover more, and unleashes our individual creativity.

The Year of Reading aim will inspire us all about what reading can do for every one of us and the huge benefits that it brings to our everyday lives; how a story can take you to a faraway place in your head, imaginary or otherwise, or how reading a technical manual can help you build something amazing that you've never built before. How reading an auto-biography can help inspire you to change your plans or fill you with admiration, or how a Sci-Fi read can help you escape you into mysterious and fantastic worlds.

Based on four themes: 'Only Human, Rebellion', 'Exploration' and 'Creation', the year will involve anyone who wants to be a part of it across the city. Everyone's invited and everyone's welcome.

To get us into the reading spirit, the launch will be set in the Central Library and libraries around the city, with many school children taking part in workshops with authors and illustrators. Also launching will be 'Sheffield's Favourite Reads'; a citywide conversation about the books everyone loves. There will be an exhibition in the Central Library, which will include the personal recommendations of numerous Sheffields, including some well-known faces. Each person will highlight their favourite book and what it means to them.

From launch day onwards, there is the opportunity for all individuals from across the city to share us what their favourite read is and they will be in with a chance of winning a £100 book token if they take part. It doesn't matter what kind of book it is, as long as it's someone's favourite. They will need to fill in a Year of Reading postcard in their library or tell us online before 31 March.

A shortlist will be drawn up on the 23rd April and an overall winner chosen in the autumn. More information is at: www.sheffield.gov.uk/yearofreading

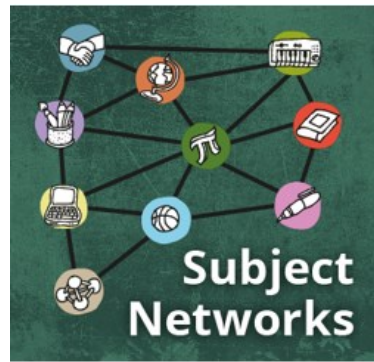

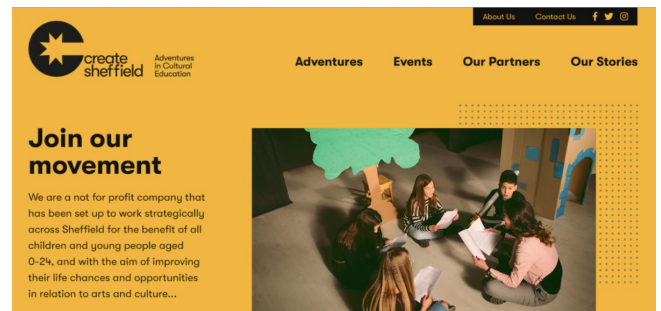

“The Lady Who Dared” has taken our Y6 children on a fascinating – and sometimes quite disturbing - journey through time, enabling them to examine how the nature of society has changed since the beginning of the 20th century, as well as opening their eyes to significant local and national events, which have brought about and impacted on these changes.

At every step of this journey the children have been encouraged to form, express and justify their own opinions, developing not only critical thinking and communication skills, but also the confidence to share these, whilst showing respect for differing points of view.

STAY WELL THIS WINTER

As you will know, schools offer the perfect breeding ground for many common winter infections. These infections then spread rapidly, causing disruption to pupils, staff and parents. If antibiotics are taken inappropriately, harmful bacteria can become resistant and stop medicine working when really needed.

We all need to use antibiotics appropriately so that they continue to work properly. Schools, children and teachers are particularly important in the fight against antimicrobial resistance (AMR).

Resources for Winter Wellness

There are some simple actions that you can take to minimise disruption and help keep your pupils and staff healthy, with a range of resources available as follows.

1. Keep Hands Clean

Good hand hygiene will reduce the risk of illnesses spreading. Alcohol hand gel can be used if necessary, but should not replace washing hands if hands are visibly soiled or when there are diarrhoea and vomiting cases in the school.

3. Keep Antibiotics Working

Eat Smart Sheffield / Food for Life—Funding Opportunity

As you are aware, as part of the Eat Smart Sheffield programme we are working with Food for Life.

They have just launched their new 'Get Togethers' programme which looks at bringing people of all ages together through growing, cooking and eating good food.

As part of this they are offering small grants of between £50 - £150 to enable you to host a 'Get Together' in your community. The money can either be used for event costs (transport, marketing, food etc) or equipment (induction hobs, fridges, durable gardening tools, etc).

Grants are to be used for meaningful intergenerational activities that bring people together through good food. They are looking to fund activity that can be sustainable and is co-created with the people and communities who will benefit.

The number of grants is limited and not guaranteed, but it is certainly worth applying especially as Food for Life are keen to hold such events in Sheffield which is one of their 'test and learn' areas.

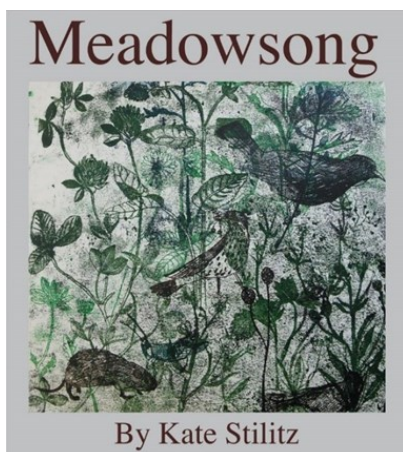
